Relevance and Applications: How might the skills in the standards be applied at home, on the job or in a real-world, relevant context?

Lasting impressions are formed based on how well people communicate in speaking and in writing. We need to be able to write and speak using standard English grammar in situations including job interviews, job applications, college applications, scholarship applications, and job/school presentations.

Employers expect employees to have a general command of English conventions and may unfairly judge us when we don't use it. For example, a resume riddled with capitalization, punctuation, and spelling errors will be less impressive than one that is written correctly.

Being able to use standard English conventions gives us more opportunities to participate in economic, political, and professional activities outside of our core communities.
