

# Unpacked South Dakota State Mathematics Standards

**Purpose:** In order for students to have the best chance of success, standards, assessment, curriculum resources, and instruction must be aligned in focus, coherence, and rigor. Unpacked standards documents are intended to help align instruction to the focus, coherence, and rigor of the South Dakota State Mathematics Standards. The standards have been organized in clusters as they are not so much built from topics, but rather woven out of progressions. Not all content in a given grade is emphasized equally in the mathematics standards. Some clusters require greater emphasis than others based on the depth of the ideas, the time that they take to master, and/or their importance to future mathematics or the demands of college and career readiness. To say that some things have greater emphasis is not to say that anything in the standards can safely be neglected in instruction. Neglecting standards will leave gaps in student skill and understanding and may leave students unprepared for the challenges of a later grade.

<b>Domain: Functions</b>		<b>Grade Level: 4th Year</b>
<b>HS4.F.IF.A Cluster: Analyze functions using different representations.</b> Students use multiple representations as they discover key features of functions.		
<p><b>This is a MAJOR cluster.</b> Students should spend the large majority of their time (65-85%) on the major work of the grade. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>Make sense of problems and persevere in solving them.</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students make sense of problems by comparing different representations of functions, discovering features of families of functions, and finding key features such as zeros or critical values.</li> </ul> </li> <li>2. <b>Reason abstractly and quantitatively.</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students discover the features of families of graphs with different representations that require them to reason quantitatively.</li> </ul> </li> <li>3. <b>Construct viable arguments and critique the reasoning of others.</b></li> <li>4. <b>Model with mathematics.</b></li> <li>5. <b>Use appropriate tools strategically.</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students use multiple representations flexibly.</li> </ul> </li> </ol>
