

Power User Frequently Asked Questions - FAQs

The Basics

What is STARS Analytics?


Currently, any reporting that districts access in SD-STARS is created by the department. This assumes the department understands what districts need, which isn't always the case. It also creates a bottleneck in getting data to districts, as any requests from districts must fit within the SD-STARS Team workload/priorities.

STARS Analytics is a new reporting feature that is available in SD-STARS. It is based on the same software that SDDOE uses for other reporting, such as the Accountability Report Card. The unique thing about STARS Analytics is it gives trained individuals access to data found in SD-STARS. These individuals can then use those data to create what are called dossiers, or reports, which can then be published to the users in a specific district via the new District Report menu in SD-STARS. Now, districts will be empowered to use SD-STARS to build their own reports for their own local-level decision making without having to go to the department.

STARS Analytics is based on the same security model as other reports found in SD-STARS. First, only users with certain permissions can access STARS Analytics dossiers. For example, a dossier could be made available to a superintendent but not a principal. Second, what students appear on the report depends on the permissions for the user. For example, teachers only see students in their classroom, principals see students in their school, and superintendents see students in their district.

Who would make a good Power User from my school/district?

An individual is a good candidate to be a Power User if they:

- Logs into SD-STARS on a regular basis.
- Can be given elevated permission by their district to access confidential district-wide student data, including free-reduced lunch data, for the purpose of creating and publishing reports for users in the district. The district must sign a SD-STARS Power User access form acknowledging this elevated permission.
- Understands educational data, especially data reported to the state by districts. This includes data like: enrollment, student demographics, state assessments, basic special education data, and accountability report card
- Is comfortable manipulating data to form lists, tables, and charts. They can organize, compare, and analyze data by using filters, colors, etc.
- Have attended a regional training within the last two years.

How is STARS Analytics the same or different from the SD-STARS reports that I already know about and use?

Current reports in SD-STARS Reports and STARS Analytics are more different than they are similar. They are similar because both can be accessed by logging into SD-STARS, both are used to display data for users, and both have security that limits what a user can see. They are different in the place in SD-STARS they can be found, the role of the Power User and the department, and who is responsible.

Current reports in SD-STARS are found when you go to REPORTS > STATE REPORTS. These reports were developed by the department, so they are state-created reports. State reports take a long time to create. There are requirements that are identified, multiple stakeholders that review, and eventually it gets to districts. The ownership of maintaining these reports, ensuring they remain working and accurate, is at the Department.


STARS Analytics reports can be found when you go to REPORTS > DISTRICT REPORTS. These reports were developed by district Power Users, so they are district-created reports. District reports are created by the district Power Users. The development, review, and ownership all lies with the district Power Users. The department maintains some of the data behind the reports, but it is the responsibility of the Power User to ensure that the reports are working and accurate.




I see a menu option called State Reports and another for District Reports. What are these menu options?

State Reports menu are available to district and school users based on their permissions. This is where you find reports that are created by the state for you to use, reports like ACT Stoplight, Special Ed Exiter, Assessment Feedback and more. The department manages this page, controlling the reports that are available and who can see the reports.



District Reports menu are reports that the Power User makes available to district and school users based on their permissions. This is where you find reports that are created by your district for you to use. The district Power Users manages and is responsible for anything on this page.



What if I move to a new district? Can I be a Power User for the new district?

Yes, but a new Power User permission slip must be completed by the new district's Superintendent and sent to STARSHelp@state.sd.us.



The Training

How is this training different than other trainings SD-STARS offers?

The SD-STARS Team updates trainings to reflect yearly changes and updates that occur in SD-STARS. Participants are introduced to how to use SD-STARS and basic functions and then the training shifts to how to use those training to make data-driven decisions for their district or school. The Power User training allows participants to develop reports using the STARS Analytic platform. Participants can use many of the same datasets that the SD-STARS Team uses to develop state reports.

Why does my district need to send a minimum of two participants to Power User Training?

The SD-STARS team wants the new Power Users to be set up for success in using this new platform. The SD-STARS team found three key benefits to sending at least two participants. First, during the Power User training, participants will learn how to make dossiers (reports or dashboard). Folks found that having only one person knowing how to do this could be overwhelming. Second, having two people familiar with STARS Analytics is important once Power Users return to their district. Third, if a Power User leave their district, that will leave the district without any Power Users.

STARS Analytics Details

What is a dossier?

A dossier is the STARS Analytics term for a report or dashboard. There are key terms that many individuals may be introduced to during this training. Here are some examples...



What is a dataset?

In STARS Analytics, there are various datasets that can be used by the **Power User**. Each **dataset** is made up of **attributes**, also known as labels, and **metrics**, also known as a measure. It is important that the Power User understands information about the datasets, attributes, and metrics to build accurate reports.

Each dataset is accompanied by a **Dataset DIG** (Data Interpretation Guide) and can be found in the **Power User Community**.





Can dossiers be shared between Power Users from different districts? In other words, is it possible for one district to use a dossier that another district creates?

Yes, this is possible. Please contact STARSHelp@state.sd.us with the following information.

- 1. The name of the district who has the dossier.
- 2. The name of the dossier.
- 3. The district that wants the dossier.

The SD-STARS Team will copy the dossier from the one district and paste it into the folder for the other district. Both districts will only see data for their district. Once the copy is made, each district can continue making changes to the dossier without affecting the other.
