

2022 MATHEMATICS STATE SNAPSHOT REPORT SOUTH DAKOTA GRADE 8 PUBLIC SCHOOLS

OVERALL RESULTS

- In 2022, the average score of eighth-grade students in South Dakota was 281. This was higher than the average score of 273 for students in the nation.
- The average score for students in South Dakota in 2022 (281) was lower than their average score in 2019 (287) and in 2003 (285).
- The percentage of students in South Dakota who performed at or above the *NAEP Proficient* level was 32 percent in 2022. This percentage was smaller than that in 2019 (39 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2003 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in South Dakota who performed at or above the *NAEP Basic* level was 72 percent in 2022. This percentage was smaller than that in 2019 (76 percent) and in 2003 (78 percent).


NAEP ACHIEVEMENT-LEVEL PERCENTAGES AND AVERAGE SCORE RESULTS



SCORE GAPS FOR STUDENT GROUPS

- In 2022, Black students had an average score that was 34 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Black students in 2003, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2022, Hispanic students had an average score that was 33 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2003, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2022, male students in South Dakota had an average score that was not significantly different from that for female students.
- In 2022, students who were eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) had an average score that was 26 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 2003 (19 points).
