# **English Learner (EL) Screening timeline**

At the beginning of the school year, identification, screening, and parental notification of eligible students must be given within 30 calendar days of enrollment. Once the school year is underway, the window to complete this process is within two weeks of enrollment. Just a reminder, those administering the screener need to complete their annual training requirements for the screener before they can administer the screener to potential ELs. Questions? 
## **Changes to the Secure Browser**

The <u>Secure Browser version 17.0</u> will become the only supported version for the 2024 – 2025 school year starting September 27. On this date, Secure Browser version 16.0 will no longer be supported, and all districts will need to update to the latest version. #### **Available Interim Assessments**

South Dakota provides three different types of Interim Assessments for math and ELA (and one type for Science). If you'd like to learn more, email us or sign up for a workshop!

- Focused Interim Assessment Blocks (FIABs) window closes May 2 assesses no more than three assessment targets to provide educators a more detailed understanding of student learning. There are typically 10 to 15 items on Focused IABs.
- Interim Assessment Blocks (IABs) window closes May 2 assessments teachers can use throughout the school year to assess smaller bundles of content than ICAs. They are intended to provide educators and students the ability to check student performance at any given moment in time, and educators can use results to determine next steps for instruction. IABs assess between three and eight assessment targets. Since the IABs are more granular than the ICAs, educators can use IABs during the school year more consistently and frequently within the sequence of their curricula. There are typically 10 to 18 items on IABs.
- Interim Comprehensive Assessment (ICA) available by request only; window closes March 7 designed to measure a broader set of content than Interim Assessment Blocks (IABs) and provide a high-level overview of student performance in the same way as summative assessments. ICAs are built on similar blueprints to the full-form summative assessments. The ICAs may also be helpful as a source of information if a student is new to the state and educational records are not available, when prioritizing the allocation of additional instructional support, and as a mid-year progress check.

### **Tools, Supports and Accommodations for Interim Assessments**

Districts that utilize the Interim Assessments should ensure students who need supports and accommodations are receiving them. Here is an overview:

- Tools are access features of the assessments that are either provided as digitally delivered (embedded) components of the test administration system or separate from it (non-embedded) and are available to all students.
- Supports are features that some students may need that are both embedded and non-embedded. Districts must mark these in TIDE.
- Accommodations are provided to students on an IEP or 504 plan if the accommodation is needed. The following accommodations must be requested by districts through TIDE Forms and approved by the South Dakota Department of Education. Questions? Email <u>Beth Schiltz</u>.
