Example strategies to reach depth and intention of the standard

- Roleplay
 - Example: Give students preselected resources and have them trade with other students to get the things their community needs. They'll be able to distinguish the pros and cons of trading for certain things.
- Poster
 - Example: Create a poster highlighting the resources in a community.
- Flyer
 - Example: Students will advertise an item they would feature to be available to trade to other students when having a classroom mock trading post. Their flyer would have to show why their item is the best to be traded with.
