Example strategies to reach depth and intention of the standard

- Students can research the fraction and divide within the United States on the topic of slavery leading up to the Civil War, with an emphasis on the Kansas and Nebraska Act of 1854 (Bleeding Kansas) (other historical events can also be used as discussion topics).
- Research public polling data from the Secretary of State to see how their local county voted in previous elections to emphasize to students how
 people in the same region can have very different views and opinions.

Possible Civic Engagement Activities

These activities include the informed actions that are explicitly tied to the curriculum that are used to assess the knowledge, skills and dispositions of effective civic engagement. Civic engagement can include research, advocacy, direct or indirect action.

Activity:	Description on How to Use the Activity and How it Meets the Grade Level:	
Class debate/discussion	 Students can choose simple topics (such as pineapple belonging on pizza) to have a debate. Teachers should review the aspects of what a respectful debate looks like before students 	

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begin. When students begin their debate, they will understand how people can have differing viewpoints on topics, but still be respectful to one another.
