| Compare and contrast how previous societies handled similar problems that we face (e.g. food shortage) | Students could learn how local, state, and federal agencies and organizations help people get food that they need. An example would be funding for local food banks and food assistance programs. Students would work to find an example in previous societies that either helped their citizens meet their basic needs or did not. Students can put this knowledge into practice by volunteering in their local organizations (such as the food pantry). | | | |
