		<ol> <li>Finding 3 (Onsite 401, 501): Reviewer observed 10 nonreimbursable meals at breakfast and 15 nonreimbursable meals at lunch. The person at point of service during breakfast did not seem to understand that students must have at least three items on their tray, so several students only had two items. The person at point of service during lunch did not seem to understand that a full cup of leafy greens is needed for a 1/2 cup vegetable. Similarly with kiwi, it takes at least two whole kiwis to equal 1/2 cup of fruit. Students must also be educated so they know what they must have on their trays. This finding will result in fiscal action.</li> </ol>
