Finding 5 (Offsite 1000-1006): Local Wellness Policy does not contain all required elements. Per 7 CFR 210.31 Local School Wellness Policy, each local educational agency must establish a Local School Wellness Policy for all schools participating in the National School Lunch Program under the jurisdiction of the local educational agency. The local school wellness policy is a written plan that includes methods to promote student wellness, prevent and reduce childhood obesity, and provide assurance that school meals and other food and beverages sold and otherwise made available on the school campus during the school day are consistent with applicable minimum Federal standards. Other school-based activities to promote wellness not identified. Documentation of outreach to stakeholders for Committee participation/update not maintained/completed. Policy does not specify that stakeholders are made aware of their ability to participate in the development, review, update, and implementation of the policy. 2) Finding 6 (Onsite 1403, 1411): Reviewer observed two food components (mandarin oranges/pineapple) were found to be non-compliant with the Buy American provision as their country of origin was outside the USA. The SFA did not have documentation on file to support an exception to the Buy American requirement for these products. Per 7 CFR 210.21(d) Buy American requirement, a food or food product is grown and/processed in the USA. At least 51% of the final processed product must be made up of domestically grown commodities. For products that are not USA grown and processed, the SFA needs to have a documentation indicating that domestic products are truly not available or reasonably priced. 3) Finding 7 (Onsite 1407): The Food Safety Plan/Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) were not implemented, reviewed, and updated as required. The Food Safety Checklist is also not completed. The checklist must be completed at least monthly, but the SOPs and checklist must identify an accurate reflection of frequency. Per 7 CFR 210.13 Facilities Management, the school food authority must develop a written food safety program that covers any facility or part of a facility where food is stored, prepared, or served. 4) Finding 8 (Onsite 1601): SFA did not inform households of the availability of SFSP. No documentation available. According to 7 CFR 210.12 Student, Parent, and Community Involvement, school food authorities must cooperate with Summer Food Service Program sponsors to distribute materials to inform families of the availability and location of free Summer Food Service Program meals for students when school is not in session. × D.
